Solar Panel Arrays

Very recently it has come to the attention of Easton Parish Council and the village, the likelihood of planning applications coming forward for solar panel arrays on fields within the parish of Easton and Letheringham, one of which is the Glevering proposal, that involves part of the development spanning land within the parish of Easton.

The company involved in the Glevering solar development is actively prepared to consult with the public and Parish Council. Their initial brochure can be found on Easton Parish Council website and further details can be found on the developer's dedicated website :
page www.grupotec-anconasolarfarm.co.uk .

The other site in Easton has a different developer. They are also proposing a site in Letheringham. Both are in the initial stages with no planning application submitted as yet. This developer has not embarked on public consultation to date.

Applicants for solar developments are mandated to request a decision from East Suffolk Council [ESC] as to whether they need to have an Environmental Impact Assessment to form part of their application. This process is between the developers and ESC and has recently taken place. The applicants are awaiting the decision from ESC. Parish councils are not part of this process.

East Suffolk Council will appoint the Easton Parish Council as a consultee once applications are submitted. Easton Parish Council will ensure correct process is followed so that its response is properly valid.

Parish councils are bound by legal conduct, any resolution for agreeing responses to planning applications must be as a result of having held a proper meeting, for which an agenda must be publicised 3 clear days ahead and the meeting must allow members of public to attend. Green energy projects are very emotive, everyone's views are important and valid and should be respected. The community of Easton will, we feel sure, conduct themselves with kindness and respect towards each other whatever their role might be.

Easton and Letheringham Community Gardening Club



We had a well-attended meeting on February 24th for the talk from Prickles Hedgehog Trust on how to protect and encourage hedgehogs in our community. It was a hugely informative talk from Paula, the founder of Suffolk Prickles Hedgehog Rescue.

There were five key takeaways that we all can do to support these amazing creatures.

- Improve the available habitat in our gardens with piles of leaves and wild areas.
- Provide access between gardens giving them freedom to roam. This helps them stay away from our roads.
- Avoid hazards in our gardens, eg open drains, netting, bonfires. Be mindful when strimming, mowing our lawns to avoid injury.
- Provide access to food and fresh water.
- Avoid pesticides (like slug pellets) allowing beneficial insects to thrive.

Hopefully we can all do our bit to help our hedgehogs.

A Sense of Place and Time

Out on the Tiles

Early spring is a good time of year to see mosses. Many are a vibrant green that really stands out before other plants begin to grow and come into leaf.

Many mosses take advantage of the high light and moisture levels in spring to produce their capsules – the equivalent of seedheads.

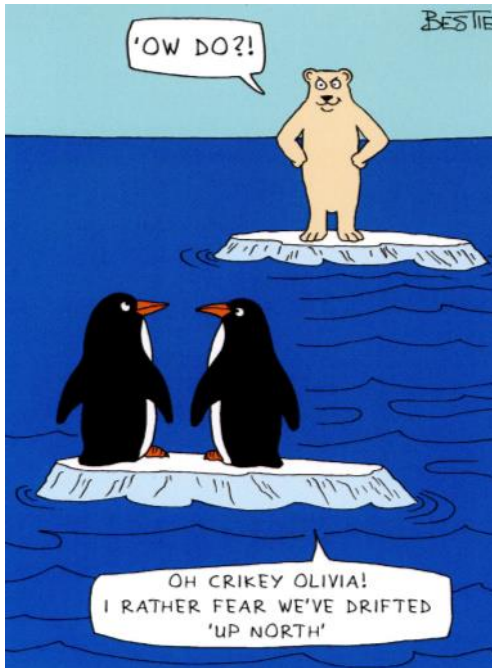
Particularly noticeable is the moss 'redshank' - *Ceratodon purpureus* - which commonly occurs on roofs and walls. In low spring sunshine its capsule stems are a deep red (hence the name redshank) and the capsules a translucent lime green.





Mosses are quite remarkable as they can fully desiccate and go dormant in times of drought and then bounce back to life as fully hydrated cushions at the first drop of rain. A very useful adaptation if you live on a roof!

DELIVERING FOR EASTON



This month I had the pleasure of speaking with students at Debenham High School, and my visit to the University of Suffolk was a particular highlight, especially as I explored the cutting-edge facilities at the UoS Dental CIC. In Westminster, we welcomed young agricultural professionals from across the Eastern region, I hosted the first of what I hope will be many Meet Your MP sessions in Debenham, and I stood alongside councillors at the Stop The Quarry campaign in Westerfield, listening to the concerns of local residents.

I also want to take this opportunity to consider transport, roads, and infrastructure across Central Suffolk & North Ipswich. Whether we drive or rely on public transport, we all depend on the accessibility, efficiency, and up-keep of our transport networks. Below standard road conditions, unreliable bus services, and inadequate investment in key infrastructure affect everyone, impacting commutes, business logistics, and overall connectivity.

In North Ipswich, growing housing developments require a transport network that can support increased demand, ensuring residents have access to safe and reliable routes to work, school, and essential services.

In rural areas such as Otley and Swilland, where public transport is sparse, well-maintained roads are critical for residents and businesses alike. The challenge is ensuring that our transport networks remain fit for purpose, balancing investment in public transport with the need for urgent road repairs and long-term infrastructure planning.

To better understand local concerns, I have launched a Transport Survey to gather residents' views on the state of our roads, infrastructure, and house-building across the constituency. The condition of local roads is a recurring issue raised with me, with concerns over potholes, road safety, and the lack of investment in rural routes.

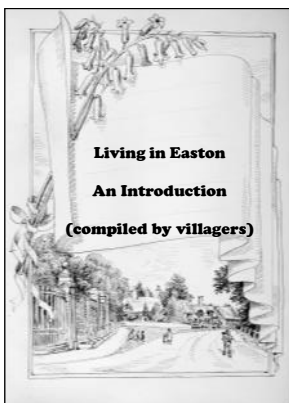
Many also feel that new housing developments are not being accompanied by the necessary improvements to roads, schools, and healthcare provision. Others have expressed frustration with the reliability of bus services, which are often a lifeline for elderly residents and those without access to a car.

Whether you feel housebuilding is too low or too high in your area, or if you believe more needs to be done to improve road surfaces and transport links, I want to hear from you. Your feedback will help shape my approach to these pressing issues, ensuring I can advocate effectively for the investment and policies our communities need. April in the Garden

Our spring has come at last with the soft laughter of April suns and shadow of April showers.

*Byron Caldwell Smith (1849–1877),
letter to Kate Stephens (1853–1938)*



Spring blossoms abound and as sunshine and showers make the grass grow lush and green, our attention turns back to lawn care after the winter rest. It's an exciting month, with indoor-sown seeds well into growth, and it's also time to start sowing outdoors - just keep an eye out for any last minute frosts.

The Ornamental Garden

Direct sow hardy annuals such as marigolds, poppies and nigella straight into the flower border

Begin to stake perennials such as hollyhocks, echinacea and delphiniums to prevent damage from wind and rain later in the season.

Keep on top of the weeds. The easiest way to do this is to run a sharp hoe over the soil surface on dry days - the weeds will wilt and die off super quickly.

Tie climbing and rambling roses into their supports now whilst they are easy to access.

Now is the time to pot up Dahlia tubers. Keep undercover until after the last frost when they can be planted outside.

Finish planting other summer flowering bulbs such as gladioli, acidanthera, lilies and crocosmia straight into the border.

Plant sweet peas out into the garden. They need a good, strong support to climb up - hazel and willow make perfect teepees.

The Kitchen Garden

Harvest asparagus spears when they're no more than 18 cm tall.

Thin carrot seedlings to achieve good-sized carrots; do this in the evening when fewer carrot flies are around.

Begin regular feeding of citrus with a specialist citrus feed. Sow tender crops - tomatoes, courgettes, sweetcorn, pumpkins, french and runner beans undercover.

Plant tomatoes, chili, sweet peppers and cucumbers into the greenhouse.

Plant maincrop potatoes giving them a good feed in the planting hole.

Direct sow leafy greens, roots and salads such as chard, spinach, carrots, beetroot, lettuce, radish into the vegetable garden.

Direct sow chives, coriander, dill, fennel, mizuna and rocket where they are to grow.

Mulch soft fruit with compost or manure to feed the soil and retain moisture.

April's gardening notes from local horticulturist Nikk Slowey FdSc Hort who, along with her husband Christian, are Honeysuckle Horticulture. Nikk is also a lecturer in horticulture at Suffolk Rural.

Latest Scam doing the rounds

A scam email, impersonating the Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency (DVLA), claims that you're 'overdue on your vehicle tax'. It includes a malicious link to 'ensure your vehicle is compliant with the DVLA.'

Protect your Pa\$\$w0rd...

Home security doesn't just mean locking your doors and windows - protecting your digital devices with strong passwords is also important to keeping yourself and your personal data safe.

Perhaps you received a new phone or laptop at Christmas, or you want to help keep your family members digitally safe.

Creating a strong password doesn't need to be complicated. Using three simple steps, you can protect your devices and digital data...

1

Create a separate, strong password for your email. Your personal email account contains lots of important information about you and is the gateway to all your other online accounts, including banking, social media and online shopping. If your email account is hacked, all your other passwords can be reset, so it's important to use a strong password for your email, that is different to all your others.

2

Use 3 random words to build your password. Using three random words is the recommended way of generating passwords, as it's easier to remember and takes trillions of years for a computer algorithm to crack. Remember to not use obvious words like your surname or the names of your pets!

3

Use 2 factor or multi-factor authentication on your devices. Two-factor authentication is a free security feature that gives you an extra layer of protection online and stops cyber criminals getting into your accounts - even if they have your password. Two-factor authentication reduces the risk of being hacked by asking you to provide a second factor of information, such as getting a text or code when you log in, to check you are who you say you are.
