JUNE IN THE GARDEN

In June the garden sings with colour and fragrance.
Every day brings new life and growth.
Take a moment to stop and enjoy it.

THE WILDLIFE GARDEN

Encourage balance in the garden by allowing natural predators to tackle the pests which munch on our plants.

Grow companion plants to attract beneficial insects.

Tolerate a bit of damage ... avoid pesticides which will kill the insects we need as well as the pests.

Keep ponds topped up, ideally with rainwater.

When removing old aquatic plant material, leave by the pond side allowing wildlife to return to the water.

Allow a little area of your garden to grow wild and incorporate wild flowers that support a host of butterflies, moths and beneficial insects.

GARDENING TIPS FOR JUNE

Plant out tender vegetables such as courgette and cucumber now the risk of frost has passed.

Sweetpeas need regular tying in, watering and feeding. Once flowering keep picking them so they don't go to seed.

Sow biennials this month.

Lift and divide iris post flowering.

Remove side shoots of tomatoes. Feed regularly once the first truss sets flower.

Foliage from spring bulbs can be removed now having allowed it to die back naturally.

Ensure your containers look good all summer by watering, feeding and dead-heading regularly.

Keep greenhouses well ventilated.

Enjoy many native plants at their best this month.

Foxgloves, cornflowers and poppies shine in June.

Make the most of the Summer Solstice on June 21st .

Most importantly, enjoy your garden.

A Sense of Place and Time

All of a spin

Go for a walk early enough that the night dew is yet to evaporate, you may well be lucky enough to see spiders' webs in the grass. These carefully woven structures are at their most visible when traced with silvery water droplets. As the sun rises, the water evaporates making the webs seemingly disappear – a great advantage for the web's purpose as an invisible trap for unsuspecting prey.



There are a number of species of spider that favour tall grasses as a 'loom' on which to 'weave' their webs, with the most common/likely being the Nursery web spider (*Pisaura mirabilis*). This spider is usually found in long grass and dense vegetation, where it hunts prey including flies and other small insects.

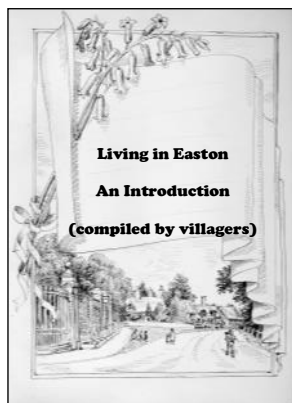

Neighbourhood Watch News for June

Some Good News!

Suffolk figures show county remains one of safest places to live

Suffolk is one of the top four counties in England and Wales where people are least likely to be victims of crime, according to figures released by the Office of National Statistics (ONS).

The total recorded crime covering the 12 months to the end of December 2023 show that there were 60.9 crimes per 1000 people, a decrease of 11% compared to the previous 12 months. From residential burglary, public order, robbery, theft from person, stalking and harassment, vehicle crime, sexual offences, knife crime and drug offences — all saw drops in recorded crimes, compared to the previous 12 month period.

Based on the ONS figures, Suffolk Constabulary is ranked fourth for the lowest levels of recorded crime in the country.
