Brian Sidney Boon

Brian was born in 1940 at Broomfield, Chelmsford, during WW2. His Suffolk born father moved to Essex in 1911 aged 27 and was too old to fight, but acted as Air Raid Warden. Brian often accompanied him when he was knocking on doors and checking gas masks were working properly. The young Brian also slept in a Morrison shelter every night, permanently installed in his bedroom. That, together with memories of a dog fight between a Spitfire and Messerschmitt, flying bombs (doodlebugs) and collecting pieces of shrapnel from the garden, provided some excitement and he had a very happy childhood.

Aged 11, he attended King Edward 6th Grammar School, excelling in mathematics and science subjects. However, upon leaving school in 1959 aged 19, he suddenly decided to join the Essex Police Force because prospects were better. Starting as a constable, he quickly advanced to Sergeant in 1967 and Inspector in 1970. During that time he also married and had three children. Hobbies included amateur radio (he ran the International Police Radio Club), crewing on a friend's yacht and being a leader in the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme helping many young people achieve their Gold Award. This culminated in an invitation to accompany those young people to Buckingham Palace.

As he approached retirement as a police officer, he set his sights upon returning to Essex Police as a civilian and offering his skills and expertise to their finance department. To prepare for this, he studied accountancy at evening classes and became a Fellow Member of the Association of Accounting Technicians. Away from work, we both studied for degrees with the Open University and Brian was awarded his BA in 1992. Holidays were very important in Brian's life and we enjoyed many trips. Some were spent camping with our family which were great fun, on our own we travelled to France most years, touring around with our tent.

However, after his second retirement aged 64, he was keen to upgrade to a camper van and we've had one ever since. In 2008 we spent three months travelling to Norway and back. This extended trip took us through France, the Netherlands, Germany, Denmark and Sweden.

We also enjoyed several cruises. Brian's bucket list included the Northern Lights and Russia and we managed both of those.

When at home, one of Brian's main interests became researching his family tree on his father's side. His parents brought him to Easton many times as a child to an aunt's at 1 Pound Corner and he was fascinated by the 'wibbly wobbly wall' as he called it. He also visited 'the Admiral' who lived in the round house nearby and delighted in the quaintness of it. His Suffolk grandparents had died before Brian was born, but he knew they were buried in the cemetery and later discovered his grandfather had worked as a horseman on the Duke of Hamilton Estate.

It was only after moving to our house in School Lane that we discovered they had actually lived in the house next to us when it was brand new in 1890. In addition, census records show that his father had also lived there until the age of 11. Later Brian took on the role of 'village historian' and wrote many articles for the parish magazine. He also served as a parish councillor for 5 years.

Brian's dementia began some years ago. Various symptoms made themselves known and we tackled them together. Anything he could remember was an opportunity for conversation, such as costing up a high-jacking at Stansted Airport when he worked as Management Accountant for Essex Police. He was always very accurate in his calculations and a valuable asset to the Force. When I came across his police Long Service Medal, engraved with 'Inspector Brian Boon', this paved the way for everyone he met to know something about him and prompted questions. I'm sure many of you reading this have had the pleasure of looking at that medal and helping Brian enjoy the delight and enthusiasm you all showed.

Overall, Brian loved life, he enjoyed helping people and had a great sense of humour with a joke for every occasion. He was a very special person and I loved him very much.

As I sit to write this month's article, it's noticeable how much the days are shortening and for me, Suffolk really is particularly beautiful basking in the warm autumnal colours. However, with the shorter days also come seasonal weather changes and living in a predominantly rural county, it is important that we all take time to look out for one another, particularly the elderly and more vulnerable who may need additional support.

Power cuts can happen at any time, especially during severe weather, so please make sure you're prepared by keeping a torch, spare batteries, a power bank, and essential supplies handy. In the event of a power cut, you can call **105** — a free, national phone number that connects you to your local electricity network operator for updates and assistance.

Equally, flooding can happen with little warning, so do please stay alert by signing up for free flood warnings from the Environment Agency and checking local forecasts. Take time to know and understand the flood risk in your local area and ensure that you have a plan in place. If you do need to report flooding in Suffolk, contact **Suffolk County Council's flooding team on 0345 606 6171**, but for emergencies or immediate danger, always call **999**.

THE WILDLIFE GARDEN

Put out high fat food for the birds to help support them through the colder months.

Planting evergreen shrubs will provide overwintering sites for butterflies and moths.

Empty and clean out bird boxes.

Always check bonfires before lighting as there may be small mammals such as hedgehogs sleeping in them.

GARDENING TIPS

Plant any new plants before first frosts are forecast. There is still enough warmth in the soil for new plants to put on some strong root growth.

Plant tulips bulbs for spring.

Harvest vegetables and flowers which dislike frost.

Prune blackcurrants.

Good time to clean out greenhouses, wash pots and seed trays and clean and sharpen tools.

Plant new soft fruit canes, bushes and trees.

Continue moving tender plants undercover before the first frosts arrive.

Plant out biennials such as wallflower, sweet william and foxgloves.

Plant garlic.

Divide overgrown clumps of herbaceous perennials whilst the soil is still warm.

Prune honeysuckle.

Remove any large fruit on figs but leave tiny embryonic figs as they are next year's fruit.

Large roses can be reduced in size to prevent wind rock.

Enjoy the changing season and the beauty of Autumn.

A Sense of Place and Time

Easton Limes

Walking in and around Easton, one of the most readily identifiable and characteristic trees is Common lime *Tilia x vulgaris* – a hybrid between the native limes - small-leaved (*Tilia cordata*) and large leaved (*Tilia platyphyllos*).

Common lime's rapid growth and stately form made it a popular choice for 'landscape' plantings when establishing parklands. It was often planted as naturalistic landscape clumps and as grand avenues.



In spring, the leaves unfurl to cast a lime-green dappled shade. Later in June and July, the sweet scent of the the flowers is very evident as you walk by, as is the buzzing of a myriad of bees and other pollinators drawn to the sweet nectar and pollen



As the summer progresses the pollinated flowers develop into clusters of globe like fruits

Each cluster has a 'wing' to catch the wind. These wings are an adaptation to aid seed dispersal, allowing the seed spread as wind borne 'helicopters'.



The relatively thin bark of lime makes it a species on which mistletoe can readily establish, most visible in winter when the leaves have fallen from the trees as shown in Easton Park silhouette of lime.

Neighbourhood Watch News for October

How scammers use gift cards in their schemes

With Christmas fast approaching, it is worth flagging up some devious ways scammers steal millions from gift cards every year.

Scammers love gift cards because they're easy to buy, hard to trace, spent quickly and can be sold on.

To make things even worse for victims of gift card scams, it can be really difficult to get your money back.

Below, we outline the most common scams involving gift cards and how to avoid them.

Emails from 'friends'

Scammers can impersonate your friends or colleagues to craft a convincing scam.

The sender's email account could be hacked, where the scammer has gained access to it through weak passwords or a data breach. Or, the scammer could have spoofed the email address – this is when a scammer masks the sender's email to make it look like the email came from a known contact.

The email will typically be crafted to give a fake reason as to why your 'friend' needs you to buy them gift cards. An example of this fake story that Which? has seen centred around a 'friend' losing their bank card while on holiday, and a gift card was urgently needed while they waited for a replacement card.

Which? also recently helped a person who was coerced into purchasing £600 worth of Apple gift cards by a scammer impersonating a senior colleague who said they were to reward staff with.

If you receive an email asking you to purchase a gift card, always contact that person using another method, such as via a phone call, to double-check it's them emailing you.

Special offers and competitions

Posts on social media from hacked and scam accounts often advertise free or heavily discounted high-value gift cards at popular retailers.

These scams usually involve a malicious link that directs you to a website where you're asked to provide personal and financial details in order to receive the non-existent card.

Sometimes the posts lead to websites that impersonate the brand, making them more convincing. In other instances, the website will claim it's not associated with the brand. However, this doesn't mean it's legitimate, and it's best to avoid offers that sound too good to be true.

Similar scams using emails that impersonate well-known brands are also common. These emails claim to offer gift cards to spend at various retailers.

These messages often state that you've been selected to receive a gift card and need to follow a link to claim the offer. Typically, the link will lead to a malicious site that asks you questions about your shopping experience at the retailer the gift card is supposedly for.

If you receive an email claiming to offer a gift card, check the email address that it's been sent from – brands have email addresses that include their brand name. You should also examine the web address carefully using a domain checker, such as at who.is. Always be suspicious of a newly created website.

Job scams

Which? has previously warned about job scams where a person is asked to buy gift cards from supermarkets and then share the Pins with the 'recruiter' as part of a sham mystery shopper position.

If you're contacted out of the blue or added to a group that advertises a job position, it's most likely a scam.

Jobs that you're offered without an interview – where you're asked to complete simple tasks, such as liking social media posts or watching movies or you're asked to invest money into a platform in order to receive more tasks to earn more money – are scams and should be avoided.

How to report a gift card scam

Scam emails can be reported by forwarding them to report@phishing.gov.uk and suspicious websites can be reported to the National Cyber Security Centre.

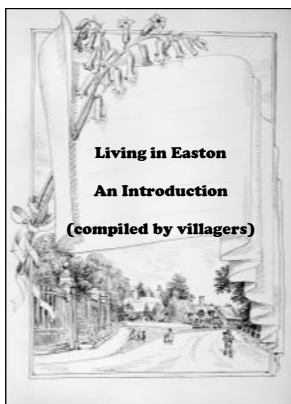
You can report social media posts and adverts by selecting the three dots in the top right corner and pressing 'report'.

If you think you've been conned in a gift card scam, contact your bank and the gift card provider immediately to try and recover your money. Sometimes the gift card provider will be able to block the gift card.

If you lose any money to a scam, call your bank immediately using the number on the back of your bank card. Also report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

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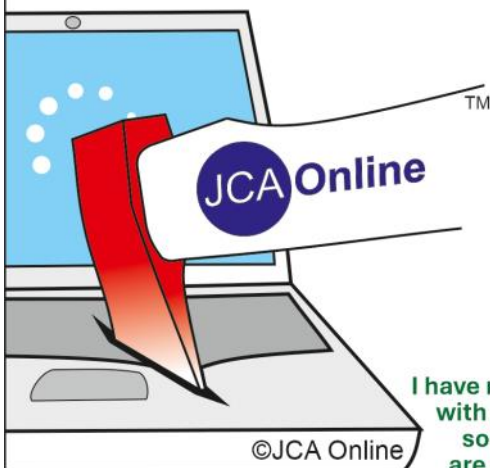
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
