Time to Act – Object Now to Protect Our Landscape



As we've previously highlighted, the number of objections matters greatly. A high volume of public objections demonstrates widespread concern and can significantly influence the decision making process.

The current deadline for objections is 5th September, and time is short.

East Suffolk is already on the path to becoming an industrial landscape of electrical generation. We are facing years of construction chaos followed by our rural environment being irreversibly changed. Local Parish Councils have been meeting, many now backed by clear mandates from their residents to object. The Stop Deben Solar Action Group will soon be writing to all local PCs to encourage formal objections.

We now have over 120 objections listed on the ESC planning portal—but we need many more. If you've already objected, thank you. But we now urge you to make sure every adult in your household does the same. People are busy—and may mean to act—but sometimes need a nudge or even to be helped through the process.

Your objection needs to quote

Planning Application Number: DC/25/2733/FUL

Site Address: Parcels to the north-west of Easton and south-west of Letheringham, Suffolk

Your Contact Details: Full name, email address, telephone number, and/or postal address

You can submit your objection in one of three ways:

1. **Online:** Use the East Suffolk Council's Public Access portal at <https://publicaccess.eastsuffolk.gov.uk/online-applications/>

Online Submission Guidance:

- You will need to **register** on the portal when you click the link.
- After registering, tick the "**Object**" **box** to indicate your stance.
- Select one or more reasons for your objection from the list provided on the webpage (e.g., traffic, environmental impact).
- Use the text box to write your objection (up to 2,000 characters).
- **Important:** The system logs off after 30 minutes of inactivity, so prepare your objection text in advance (e.g., in a text editor) to avoid losing your work.

2. **Email:** Send to planning@eastsuffolk.gov.uk.

We also recommend copying your objection to local councillors: vince.langdon-morris@eastsuffolk.gov.uk, owen.grey@eastsuffolk.gov.uk, elaine.bryce@suffolk.gov.uk, and your MP, Patrick.spencer.mp@parliament.uk.

3. **Post:** Address to Planning Team, Riverside, 4 Canning Road, Lowestoft, Suffolk, NR33 0EQ.

You may also wish to submit a comment on a related application by Grupotech for a 20MW solar installation (Ref: DC/25/2997/FUL) at: Land South Of Easton Lane, Glevering Park House, Glevering Estate, Wickham Market, Suffolk IP13 0EX. Our own campaign is against DC/25/2733/FUL, a 49.9MW proposal.

Be assured we are supportive of producing electricity from sustainable sources, but the location of these Solar Farms needs careful thought to minimise the industrialisation of the countryside and the associated disruption to residents.

Encourage your friends to object too. If possible, sit down with them in submitting an objection. The Stop Deben Solar Action Group is even considering door to door canvassing before the deadline—we are committed to going the extra mile. Visualise this unhappy landscape of the future and if you feel as strongly as we do, please take action within your own network.

Finally, our group have already provided funding towards paying for expert consultants whose knowledge and experience can carry significant weight in opposing this application and additional funds are required and If you are in a position to contribute, we would be very grateful.

This month I'd like to start by thanking everyone who attended the public meeting on Tuesday 12th August to discuss the planning application for solar arrays that have been submitted for land in both Easton and Letheringham.

Whilst there was clearly much emotion on display during the meeting, I feel that everyone present had an opportunity to share their feelings on it and to highlight their concerns with the application as it stands.

Following the meeting, we held an extraordinary Easton Parish Council meeting where we discussed our response to the plans in more detail. In response to the views of the overwhelming majority of attendees at the earlier meeting, we decided unanimously that we will be objecting to the plans.

In the last few days we have also received details of the planning application for another solar development on Hacheston Road. We will, of course, be holding another meeting as soon as we can schedule it to gather people's views, be they positive or negative, on this proposed development. I would hope that by time this magazine is published we will have the date firmly in the diary, indeed we may have even had it.

Finally from me, I'd like to remind you that we have our **village clear up morning on Saturday 6th September.** (See poster over page.) It's not too late to register so if you feel you can lend a hand (it won't all be too strenuous), then please do drop an email to Andrew, our Parish clerk, who will get you registered. Following the event we will be offering light refreshments in the Village Hall.

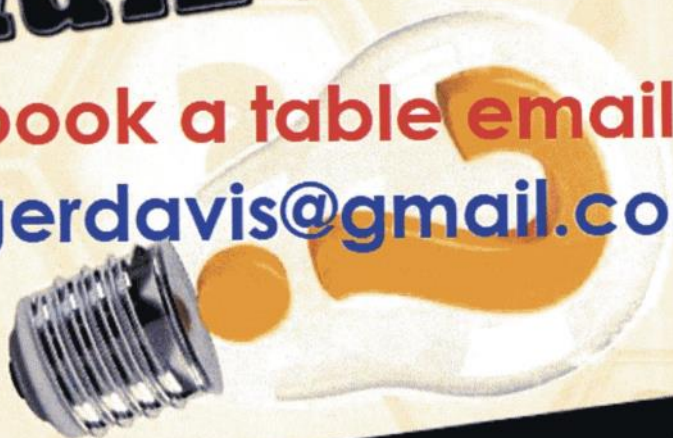

THE WILDLIFE GARDEN

Create piles of logs, twigs and rocks to provide shelter for wildlife.

In late Summer butterflies like red Admiral and painted lady will appreciate fallen fruit left on the ground.

Clean out nesting boxes once all chick's have fledged so they are ready for next spring.

Look out for house martins and swallows on the move to warmer climes.

Waxwings and fieldfares return to the UK from Northern Europe and colder climates.

GARDENING TIPS

Continue to deadhead summer flowering plants such as dahlia, penstemon, rudbeckia to prolong flowering.

Start planting bulbs for spring but leave planting tulips until the colder months.

Prune summer fruiting raspberries. Removing old canes and tying in new canes.

Turn compost heap and water if dry.

Sow green manures direct to improve soil quality.

Sow winter salads to enjoy during the colder months.

Harvest tomatoes and basil before the cold nights set in and turn them black.

Sow hardy annuals direct.

Start clearing summer bedding as your display starts to fade.

September is the best month to sow new lawns from seed.

Tie in rambling roses and remove a few of the old stems.

Clip evergreen hedges.

Start moving tender plants under cover before the frost arrives.

September gives us the chance to take stock and enjoy the fruits of our labours.

We can garden at a slower pace and enjoy the changing season.

A Sense of Place and Time

Flying the flag

Flag iris - *Iris pseudacorus* is a native perennial found in a variety of wetland habitats and can be readily seen along the river and ditch margins in Easton.



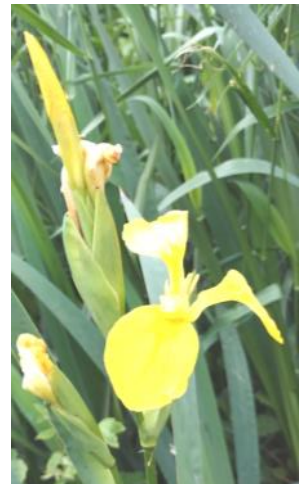
It is particularly noticeable when in flower, its bright yellow flowers said to add a 'touch of sunshine' to habitats where it grows.

The leaves are typical of iris, being flat and sword like, whilst the flowers have distinctive drooping petals and are said to be a symbol of power, with the three parts representing wisdom faith and courage. The flowers are also thought to be the origin of the fleur-de-lis symbol seen in heraldry.

The name 'flag' comes from the old English 'flagge' meaning rush or reed. Flag iris is characteristic of similar habitats to rush and reed and has leaves very similar to reed.

There is to be a joint meeting of all the benefice PCCs at Kettleburgh Village Hall on 1st September at 7 pm.

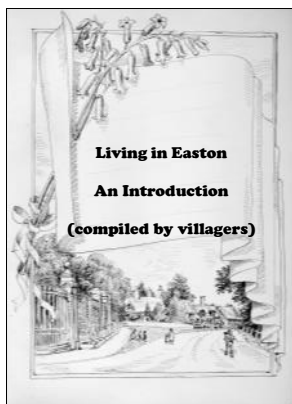
Big Breakfast

Neighbourhood Watch News for September

Buying and selling tickets – your safety guide

We've all experienced that mixture of hopefulness and elation that comes with trying to get tickets to a must-see live event. But that promise of an unmissable moment can quickly turn sour if you fall victim to an online ticket scam from an unregulated site, on social media, a fan forum or auction platform.

Don't let your excitement lead to disappointment. Here's your checklist to safer buying online.

Use a regulated platform

- **Do your homework:** Purchase tickets only through a legitimate and regulated platform. If you are unsure of a website's legitimacy, you can check it by using Get Safe Online's Check a Website tool.
- **Cover yourself:** Ensure platforms offer fan protection with a guarantee should anything go wrong. Regulated ticket market places such as viagogo offer a money back guarantee. Buyers are guaranteed to receive valid tickets in time for the event and if an issue arises, Viagogo will step in to provide comparable replacement tickets or a refund.
- **Resist the hard sell and social media:** Getting in-demand tickets can feel like a race against time but don't let individual sellers pressure you into a quick purchase. It's best to avoid buying tickets on social media where many sellers are unverified, increasing the risk of scams or counterfeit tickets. Plus, social media platforms often lack buyer protection, making it harder to get a refund if something does go wrong.

- **Choose 24/7 support:** Buy tickets from a regulated site that offers 24/7 customer support to make sure help is always available if you experience issues, like trouble accessing your tickets. Round-the-clock support also provides peace of mind, knowing you can quickly resolve any unexpected problems.
- **Verify the venue and date:** If the event is taking place at a venue unknown to you, then confirm its existence through online maps and look for independent reviews. Once you have done so, search the original live event announcement or schedule on the artiste or team's website to make sure dates and location align.
- **Price check reality:** If a deal seems too good to be true, it probably is. Avoid suspiciously cheap tickets.

Protect your information

- **Avoid transfers; pay with credit card:** Unless you're dealing with a trusted or regulated platform, avoid bank transfers. Direct payment methods do not provide protection or allow you to track your order, they also limit your ability to recoup your money in the case of a scam. Credit cards offer better protection.
- **Stick to the platform:** Don't share your contact details with anyone outside of the company you're purchasing tickets from and be wary of any sellers asking you to take the transaction off the platform. Any transactions that take place off the platform will not be protected, nor will any information you share.
- **Secure sites only:** Make sure the website uses a secure connection (https) before entering payment details.
- **Don't display details:** Visible barcodes, QR codes and order numbers can lead to your information, or the security of your ticket, being compromised. Protect your ticket, cover up any visible information.

Be vigilant

- **Save your receipts:** Keep copies of all confirmations and payments.
- **Monitor your statements:** Watch out for any unauthorised charges.
- **Report fraud immediately:** If you suspect fraud, report it to your bank and to Action Fraud at actionfraud.police.uk/reporting-fraud-and-cyber-crime or if you prefer, on 0300 123 2040. By following these tips, you can protect yourself from online ticket scams and enjoy the show without worry. Trust your gut and know a little caution can go a long way.

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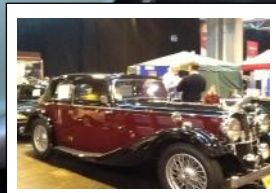

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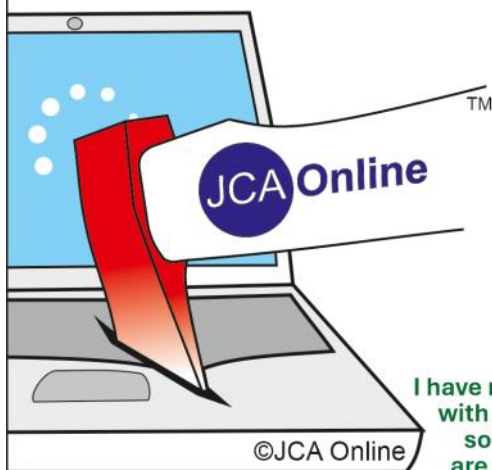
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
